The state of California remains on strong economic footing thanks to higher than expected revenues.

- Revenue collections have grown rapidly in recent months, coming in over \$10 billion ahead of budget act expectations so far this year.
- The 2022-23 state budget totals \$308 billion, up from \$265 billion in the 2021-22 budget.
- Key themes include:
 - Assistance and financial relief to millions of families and small businesses.
 - Massive multi-year commitments to the state's infrastructure including transportation, energy reliability and clean energy investments.
 - Defending a woman's right to choose and other health care issues.
 - Historic spending in education.
 - Building a reserve to protect against an uncertain future (recession?).

Judicial Branch

Supreme Court – \$53.75 million*

Courts of Appeal – \$265.4 million*

Judicial Council – \$441.6 million*

Habeas Corpus Resource Center – \$17.2 million*

And over \$5.0 billion in additional funding to support local judicial organizations, court modernization and other key items.

- \$34.7 million in 2022-23, increasing to \$40.3 million in 2025-26 and ongoing, for information technology initiatives including the creation of the Judicial Branch Information Security Office to improve cyber security, modernization of the Appellate and Supreme Court IT systems, and ongoing branch wide and trial court initiatives that began in the 2020 Budget Act.
- \$33.3 million in 2022-23 and 2023-24 and \$1.6 million ongoing to implement remote access pursuant to Chapter 526, Statutes of 2021 (AB 716).
- \$15 million in 2022-23 and \$3.8 million ongoing to implement a data and information framework to enable timely and accurate data collection from the trial and appellate courts.



Judicial Branch

- \$220 million to design and build new courthouses in Lakeport, Ukiah and Modesto.
- 165.5 million for capital projects in Santa Clarita, Quincy, Butte County, San Bernardino County, Fairfield, Fresno, San Luis Obispo, Kings County and other locations.

IT Initiatives and Opportunities





K12 Education

- \$128.6 billion for all K12 programs (highest ever)
- Over 220 new positions funded
- K12 School Construction and Modernization Funds:
 - Prop 51 (Facilities Bond Act of 2016) \$1.4 billion in remaining funds
 - \$1.3 billion with 2021-22 funds, approximately \$2.1 billion in 2023-24 and \$875 million in 2024-25 to support new construction and modernization projects through the School Facility Program.
 - \$250 million to support a school facility project in the Lynwood Unified School District.
 - \$100 million with 2021-22 funds and \$550 million in 2023-24 to support the Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (supports construction or retrofit).
 - \$30 million Proposition 98 General Fund per year for two years to support eligible facilities costs for the Charter School Facility Grant Program.



- **\$252 thousand** to support the development and maintenance of a computer-based English Language Proficiency Assessment for California (ELPAC) and a computer-based alternative ELPAC for students with disabilities.
- \$4.25 million and 6.0 positions are available in the 2022–23 fiscal year, and \$1 million and 6.0 positions are available thereafter to support departmental information security infrastructure.
- \$1.16 million and 2.0 positions are available in the 2022–23 fiscal year, and \$266 thousand and 2.0 positions are available thereafter, to support increased departmental information technology needs and workload.
- \$167 thousand is provided for Zoom licenses to host webinars and online meetings.
- \$374 thousand for the Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team for the purpose of providing, through computer technology, financial and demographic information that is interactive and immediately accessible to all local educational agencies to assist them in their decision making process.





Education - CalKIDS Program

- An increase of approximately \$5.3 million in 2022-23, approximately \$2.1 million ongoing, and 2 positions to support CalKIDS implementation and administration, including participant notifications and marketing, call center services, and information technology needs.
- Note: This program is administered by the ScholarShare Investment Board at the Treasurer's Office



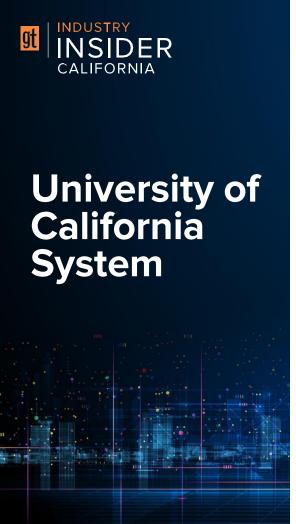
Higher Education

- Total funding of \$41.6 billion
- The state's three public segments the UC, the CSU, and the CCCs — each receive substantial ongoing base augmentations.



Education Student Housing

- **\$1.4 billion** for student housing construction grants for specified projects. Of this amount:
 - \$389 million is provided for UC projects
 - \$487.9 million is provided for CSU projects
 - \$542.1 million is provided for CCC projects
 - \$9.1 million is provided for an intersegmental project.
 - In addition, the Budget provides \$18 million for planning grants at specified CCCs.



- An increase of \$200.5 million ongoing Proposition 98 General Fund for operating costs, representing a five-percent base increase in ongoing General Fund resources.
- An increase of \$500 million over a three-year period (\$200 million in 2022-23, with an additional \$200 million in 2023-24 and \$100 million in 2024-25 planned for this purpose) to establish the Institute for Immunology and Immunotherapy at UCLA.
- An increase of \$249 million over a three-year period (\$83 million in each of 2022-23, 2023-24 and 2024-25) to support campus expansion projects at the Riverside and Merced campuses.



California State University System

- An increase of \$211.1 million ongoing Proposition 98
 General Fund for operating costs, representing a five-percent base increase in ongoing General Fund resources.
- An increase of \$83 million to support the construction of the CSU Bakersfield Energy Innovation Center.
- An increase of \$80 million to expand the San Diego
 State University, Brawley Center in Imperial Valley.
- An increase of \$79 million to support a new student center at the Palm Desert campus of CSU San Bernardino.
- An increase of \$67.5 million toward construction of the Engineering and Computer Science Innovation Hub at CSU Fullerton.





- An increase of \$600 million ongoing Proposition
 98 General Fund for a base increase to the Student Centered Funding Formula (SCFF).
- \$75 million one-time and \$25 million ongoing to address modernization of technology infrastructure including sensitive data protection efforts.
- \$105 million one-time funding to support the system wide implementation of a common course numbering system.
- \$25 million in additional funding to support the procurement and implementation of software that maps intersegmental curricular pathways to help students choose their pathway, facilitate streamlined transfer between segments, and reduce excess units taken on the path to degree or program completion.



- General Obligation bond funding of \$403 million one-time for the construction phase of 19 projects anticipated to complete design by Spring 2023, the design phases of 2 projects, and both the working drawings and construction for 1 project.
- \$23 million to expand the delivery of courses through technology. \$3 million of this shall be disbursed to one or more community college districts to provide textbooks or digital course content to inmates under the jurisdiction of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation who are enrolled in one or more California Community College courses.
- \$10.6 million to continue providing a systemwide and integrated online infrastructure that supports the continuity of education and quality distance learning across the community college system.



• **\$41.89 million** for:

- 1. Procurement, development, evaluation, and upgrading of high priority systemwide technology tools and infrastructure including, but not limited to, e- transcript, e-planning, and other tools to assist colleges to implement multiple measures of assessment and technologies that facilitate portability of education credentials.
- 2. Provision of access to statewide multi- media hosting and delivery services for colleges and districts.
- 3. Provision of systemwide internet, audio bridging, data security, and telephony.
- 4. Services related to technology use, including accessibility guidance and information security.
- 5. Technology product development and program management, technical assistance and planning, and cooperative purchase agreements.
- 6. Ongoing faculty and staff development related to technology use and adoption.
- Ongoing support of the California Partnership for Achieving Student Success (Cal-PASS) program.
- 8. Ongoing support for programs designed to use technology in assisting accreditation and the alignment of curricula across K–20 segments in California, as well as to support integration and inter-operability toward an improved student experience.
- 9. Support for technology pilots and ongoing technology programs and applications that serve to maximize the utility and economy of scale of the technology investments of the community college system toward improving learning outcomes.
- 10. Up to 5 percent of the funds may be allocated by the chancellor to a community college district for statewide activities, not limited to statewide technical assistance to evaluate, plan, and continuously improve the system's data and technology roadmap and deployment.

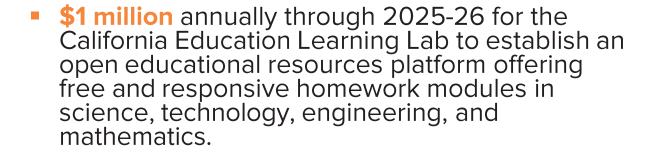




\$4 million to expand the implementation of the systemwide technology platform for library services to better manage and deliver digital information to sup- port teaching and learning, including for students enrolled in distance education.

California State Library

- \$50 million in 2022-23, and a planned increase of \$100 million in 2023-24, for an equity-focused matching grant program to support local library maintenance, improve energy efficiency and sustainability, and expand digital and physical access to libraries.
- \$68.2 million to establish the Statewide Imagination Library.
- \$570 thousand ongoing to modernize State Library services with an automated loan system, and provide subscriptions to e-books and specialized online databases.
- \$3.97 million to support access by public libraries to a high-speed internet network.
- \$3.38 million for Information Technology Services (no details provided).
- \$291 thousand for Information Technology Services (no details provided).





Department of Pesticide Regulation

\$4.1 million to fund the California
 Pesticide Electronic Submission Tracking (CalPEST) project (formerly Pesticide Registration Database Management System).



Department of Conservation

- \$185 thousand to support the web application, security, compliance, backend database, functional enhancements and GIS integration of the Mines Online Document Storage (MODS) system.
- \$3.26 million in 2022-23, and \$3.0 million ongoing to increase functionality of WellSTAR and strengthen data integrity, accessibility, reliability and consistency for internal and external use.



- One-time funding of \$15 million in 2022-23 to cover increased costs for the Information Technology Baseline.
- \$21 million over six fiscal years to replace obsolete 9-1-1 and public safety radio communications audio logging systems currently in use at the CHP's 24 communications centers. The request includes a disaster recovery system to meet continuity of operations requirements.



\$802 thousand to establish a departmentwide Enterprise Content Management (ECM) System. Up to \$4.7 million to augment upon Stage 4 Project Readiness/Approval.



Food and Agriculture

- \$1.95 million in 2022-23 and \$964 thousand in 2023-24 to complete the planning activities to replace the existing legacy Emerging Threats Information Data Management System.
- \$3.48 million in 2022-23, \$2.99 million in 2023-24, and \$1.54 million in 2024-25 and ongoing to manage, implement, and maintain mitigation efforts to resolve highrisk information technology security findings.



Veterans Affairs

\$1.35 million for information technology refresh. Refresh generally includes replacing current desktop computing devices (computers, printers, monitors, etc.); replacing core network infrastructure; and replacing medical IT equipment.



Corrections and Rehabilitation

- \$12.6 million in 2022-23, \$18.5 million in 2023-24, and \$1.7 million ongoing beginning in 2024-25 to establish an Enhanced Managed Access System to block contraband cell phone usage within 20 prisons.
- \$224 thousand for the purpose of completing the procurement of a technology contract relating to the Armstrong Court Compliance Continuation Budget Change Proposal.



Health Care Access

 \$20 million to the Department of Health Care Access and Information to assist reproductive health care facilities in securing their physical and information technology infrastructure and to enhance facility security.



Public Utilities Commission

- \$5.8 million for fiscal year 2022-23 and \$6 million ongoing from various special funds for ongoing maintenance and support costs of enterprise-wide information technology solutions.
- \$1.96 million in 2022-23 and \$200 thousand ongoing to procure, implement, and license the Human Capital Management (HCM) system.
- \$1.85 million from various special funds for ten (10.0) new permanent full-time positions in the Information Security Office.



Public Utilities Commission

- \$125 million for completing and supporting last-mile broadband infrastructure.
- \$1.25 million enhancements to the Program Management Claims System shall be allocated upon order of the Department of Finance. A Special Project Report 3 must be approved by the California Department of Technology prior to these funds being made available.



Housing and Community Development

\$6.7 million to improve its monitoring and management of loans and grants business programs through the procurement and implementation of a new enterprise Information Technology (IT) solution for the Consolidated Housing Accountability Application Procurement Project.



California State Payroll System

• \$83.25 million for planning and implementation of the California State Payroll System, subject to Joint Legislative Budget notification, once the project completes its Department of Technology review and the State Controller's Office submits an oversight report to the Legislature.



CalFire

\$5.6 million and 20 positions to establish the Fire Integrated Realtime Intelligence System (FIRIS) program to increase the real-time information and situational awareness available to the state and California's mutual aid system responders and managers on all hazards events, including wildfires.



Criminal Justice

\$20 million to establish a competitive grant program for counties to establish mobile probation centers. Grant funding will help with one-time investments, such as the purchase of vehicles and technology, including computers, internet, phones, televisions, and video communication.



Secretary of State

- \$2 million to establish and operate the Office of Elections Cybersecurity.
- \$7 million for project activities related to the California Automated Lobbyist and Campaign Contribution and Expenditure Search System Replacement System project.



Aid to Local Government

\$10 million for grants to county assessor offices to provide information technology system improvements.





 \$9.7 million of new expenditure authority and reimbursement authority of \$8.54 million in 2023-24 and ongoing to improve the Agency's Information Technology security posture.



Toxic Substances Control

 24.0 permanent positions and \$6.1 million in 2022-23 and annually thereafter to address the gaps between workload and current Office of Environmental Information Management (OEIM) information technology (IT) staffing levels and technology costs.



 \$162.66 million ongoing, primarily attributed to external investment management fees, administrative operating costs, and technology expenses.



\$17.3 million in permanent funding and 10 positions for fiscal year 2022–23 and ongoing to address various operational support and management activities. This includes service contracts related to property management services for the CalSTRS headquarters property, and various on-going information technology capabilities.



Franchise Tax Board

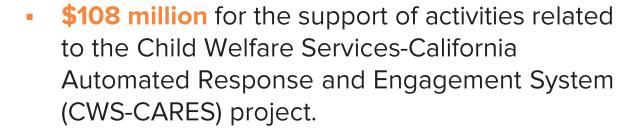
•\$2.53 million to fund the Statewide Property Inventory Modernization Project in the 2022–23 fiscal year.



- \$535 thousand to complete Project Approval Lifecycle stage 3 for the Enterprise Data Governance Technology Solution project.
- \$1.6 million to support 10 administrative services positions in the Division of Accounting and Division of Information Technology to support the increased workload for preliminary planning activities required in preparation for Caltrans on-boarding to the FI\$Cal System.
- \$50.2 million and 295 positions ongoing to implement the increased state and local transportation funding provided through the Federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).



Office of System Integration





Department of Public Health

- \$20.1 million for the Information Technology, Data Science, and Informatics Framework for a 21st Century Public Health System. This amount may be augmented by \$15.88 million for planning activities association Initiative 0 (Enterprise Planning), Initiative 1 (Dynamic Public Health Structure, and Initiative 4 (Public Health Data Integration of the Information Technology, Data Science, and Informatics Framework for a 21st Century Public Health System.
- Up to \$5.94 million to support the Surveillance, Health, Intervention, and Environmental Lead Database project.
- Over 210 new positions created in the Department.



Social Services

\$6.23 million for the external consulting and professional services associated with the design, development, and implementation of the Facility Management System project that planned as a Platform as a Service solution...



Health Care Services

- Over 255 new positions funded in the budget.
- \$17.5 million in 2022-23 and \$17.4 million in 2023-24 to advance improvements in data quality in managed care and county behavioral health.
- Expenditure authority of \$7.56 million in FY 2022-23, \$8.97 million in FY 2023-24, \$8.47 million in FY 2024-25, and \$5.39 million in FY 2025-26 and ongoing for resources to address increased workload related to departmental data analytic, data provisioning, and data reporting functions to improve data management and transparency



Managed Health Care

Over 90 new positions funded in the budget.



Natural Resources Agency

\$16.4 million for support of the California Climate Information System (CalCIS).



Employment Development

- \$313.4 million over the next three years to continue to address fraud in the Unemployment Insurance (UI) and State Disability Insurance programs.
- \$23.5 million for three years to maintain and improve benefit system usability to better serve claimants and prevent fraud.
- \$10.2 million in 2022-23 and \$6.1 million through 2024-25 to support cybersecurity and prevention efforts to improve the security and integrity of EDD IT systems, which hold tax data and other personal information.
- \$1.5 million for three years for a Unemployment Insurance Command Center that centralizes UI branch management, supports UI data analytics, and enhances training to improve customer service.



Employment Development

- \$34 million for the support of the EDDNext modernization effort. This amount may be augmented up to a maximum of \$34 million for project activities upon approval by the Department of Finance, in consultation with the Department of Technology.
- \$10.2 million in 2022-23, \$6.1 million in 2023-24 and 2024-25, and authorizes 29 cybersecurity positions, totaling \$22.4 million, in order to assist with fraud mitigation and improve cybersecurity and suspicious event monitoring, response, and resiliency.



Department of Developmental Services

- \$5 million to pilot a program to develop remote technology supports to increase consumer independence.
- \$905 thousand to meet federal and state information technology risk and compliance requirements, operate and maintain DDS' security systems infrastructure, and support the increasingly complex technology and data needs of DDS' business programs.



Military Department

Up to \$1.23 million for the California Cybersecurity Integration Center.



- \$18.99 million in 2022-23 and \$10.54 million ongoing for information technology modernization phase II.
- \$30 million ongoing General Fund for the Fire Integrated Real-Time Intelligence System (FIRIS).



Bureau of Firearms

\$5.2 million to continue the planning and development phase of combining and modernizing 11 existing firearms tracking systems.



- \$300 million in 2023-24 and \$250 million in 2024-25, for the California Department of Technology (CDT) to support the completion of the Broadband Middle-Mile Initiative.
- \$54.6 million to: (1) reduce State Data Center IT service rates by shifting funding for some of its internal administrative expenditures and positions from cost recovery to General Fund; and (2) cover short-term net revenue losses in resulting from some state entities moving the provision of their IT services from the State Data Center to private vendors.
